It Has Been an Honor and a Privilege

Baptist Health Sciences University President Betty Sue McGarvey, Ph.D., R.N. recently announced her summer 2023 retirement to colleagues and students. After 48 years as a student, nurse, professor

invest in what you're doing and the people

and accomplished leader, Dr. McGarvey is stepping down from her decades of professional service to the University.

Dr. McGarvey began her journey graduating with a nursing diploma from then Baptist Memorial School of Nursing in 1978. "It was kind of a fluke that I ended up in nursing school as a student to start with," said Dr. McGarvey. "I just knew I wanted a meaningful career."

She worked in several units at the Baptist Medical Center including emergency department and cardiac while also earning a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from then Memphis State University.

"I loved working at the bedside," said Dr. McGarvey. "I enjoyed caring for and interacting with patients and their families and working with so many different professionals in the hospital."

One of her nursing roles was as the staff development instructor for the emergency department and that is where she realized how much she enjoyed teaching and education. Starting in 1993, she moved to full-time teaching at then Baptist Memorial School of Nursing.

"I did not realize when I went to the School of Nursing that they were beginning to consider moving to a collegiate model. I was blessed to be a part of the founding planning committee who worked on the transition to Baptist Memorial College of Health Sciences," says Dr. McGarvey.

She has witnessed many changes at Baptist since she began working as a nursing assistant during nursing school. Baptist Memorial Health Care has had five leaders in its 110-year history and Dr. McGarvey has worked or studied under four of them; Dr. Frank Groner who served as system administrator from 1946-1980, Joseph Powell who led from 1980-1994, Stephen C. Reynolds, who served as system administrator from 1994-2014, and now Jason Little who has led Baptist Memorial Health Care since 2014.

Dr. McGarvey earned additional degrees during her tenure at Baptist including a Master of Science in Nursing in 1990 and a Doctorate in Philosophy of Nursing in 2002.

Several positions and years later, Dr. McGarvey assumed the role of President when Dr. Rose Y Temple retired in June 2005.

"Dr. Temple was an important mentor to me," said Dr. McGarvey. "She encouraged me professionally and personally; I learned a lot from her outstanding example of leadership."

In the last 18 years, a lot has happened; the then College started

offering doctorate level programs and became Baptist Health Sciences University in 2020. The use of technology in both learning and the health care field has transformed the way education and health care are provided.

"Our student body has changed to reflect the communities we serve," said Dr.

McGarvey, "and many of our students have had some college or are second career students seeking additional degrees."

The University has expanded its footprint in both student recruitment and clinical education opportunities as the Baptist Memorial Health Care system has expanded its reach to 22 hospitals across Tennessee, Mississippi and Arkansas over the years.

"I have had some incredible mentors through the years," said Dr. McGarvey. "And one of them reminded me often that leadership is about relationships. He affirmed for me that connections with others is the key ingredient with people you work with internally and externally.



Dr. McGarvey is proud that alumni are well represented within BMHCC and at the University. Many professors and staff are alumni from the University and worked in the Baptist system before returning to share their expertise and wisdom with future health care professionals. "It is always an honor to welcome alumni back to the University to serve and teach the next generation of students," explained Dr. McGarvey.

Dr. McGarvey has always been a visionary. The University was recently awarded candidacy status for a proposed college of osteopathic medicine to help educate and train doctors of osteopathic medicine, to help serve our community's medical needs.

"It has been an honor to work alongside Dr. McGarvey," said Zach Chandler, executive vice president and chief strategy officer at Baptist Memorial Health Care. "Her visionary leadership is demonstrated in the University's transition in 2020, offering graduate and doctorate level degrees, not to mention the proposed college of osteopathic medicine that we hope to open in 2024. We've relied on BHSU to educate health care providers to our communities for more than a century, almost a quarter of that under the presidential leadership of Dr. McGarvey."

Dr. McGarvey is well-respected by her peers, students, Baptist Memorial Health Care leadership and her board of directors.

"Dr. McGarvey is very goal oriented," said Anita Vaughn, former CEO and administrator of Baptist Memorial Hospital for Women and Spence and Becky Wilson Baptist Children's Hospital who has been on the University board of directors since she retired in 2016.

Anita served on the search committee when Dr. McGarvey was hired as president of the then College.

"Wow did we luck into Dr. McGarvey," said Anita of that time. "The Lord really opened doors for us and what a wonderful thing. It has been the ultimate pleasure to work with her and towards the goals she has set."

Dr. McGarvey is also grateful for the leaders who have supported her over the years. "I am forever grateful for their ability to lead while never losing sight of the Baptist mission of healing, preaching and teaching," she said. "Baptist has been a wonderful place to work and grow."

When asked for her advice for students, Dr. McGarvey said she encourages them to connect daily with their passion for their work and remember what excited them about their vocation in the beginning.

"Keep what you do something personal, invest in what you're doing and the people you are serving," said Dr. McGarvey. "As long as you continue to do that, you'll grow and be successful."

In her next big role of retirement, Dr. McGarvey plans to spend time with her husband and their family, and do some traveling.

"The years have flown by; I look back and think 'how did that happen?'," she said. "But I will be a Baptist Blue Healer for life!"

Dr. Cathy Stepter is a 1992 graduate of the Baptist School of Nursing diploma program. She has gone on to earn several more degrees; Bachelor of Science in nursing from Union University in 1995, Master of Science in nursing, adult health clinical nurse specialist from Arkansas State University in 2001, a Doctorate in Nursing Practice from Georgia Southern University in 2012 and a post master's certificate in adult-gerontology from Vanderbilt University School of Nursing. She is licensed as an advanced practice nurse in Tennessee and Mississippi. Dr. Stepter was recently named Dean for the Division of Nursing at Baptist Health Sciences University.

Dr. Stepter most recently oversaw the development and creation of the Doctor of Nursing program at Baptist Health Sciences University in 2018, serving as the inaugural program chair. Dr. Stepter has also served as Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, and Professor of Nursing. She also worked as a registered nurse in the Baptist Memorial Health Care system from 1992 until 2009 when she began teaching full time.

In her new role, she will continue to grow enrollment in the traditional BSN, RN-BSN completion, and DNP programs to help meet the health care needs of our communities.

Dr. Stepter is a fellow in the American Association of Colleges of Nursing 2021 Elevating Leaders in Academic Nursing. Through her work, she secured grant funding for a student mentoring program and helped establish a clinical nurse residency program.

Dr. Anne Plumb, Dean Emeritus, BHSU Division of Nursing, said this about Dr. Stepter assuming the role of Dean, "Dr. Stepter's 18 years teaching in the Baptist system, in addition to her leadership role as Doctor of Nursing

Dr. Marcy Purnell named new Doctor of Nursing Practice Program Chair

Marcy Purnell, Ph.D., APN, FNP-C, was recently named the new Doctor of Nursing Practice Program Chair, in August 2022. She has an extensive history in both nursing practicum and education.

Most recently, Purnell served as an endowed chair of nursing for Louisiana State University Health Science Center, a position she held for two years. Before that, she served as Visiting Faculty in the School of Leadership and Advanced Nursing Practice at The University of Southern Mississippi. In fact, she has held teaching and faculty positions across the country since 1991.

Purnell has worked as a nurse practitioner in primary care clinics and at Stern Cardiovascular Clinic.

To say her love of nursing and education runs deep is an understatement.

"I knew I wanted to be a nurse from age six," said Purnell.

She earned a Bachelor of Science in nursing from University of Tennessee in 1986, at a time when many of her nursing colleagues were earning associate degrees and certificates, not bachelor's degrees. When her four children got a bit older, Purnell decided to go back to school to earn a Master of Science in nursing, a family nurse practitioner certification and a Ph.D. Purnell promotes the idea of nurses earning advanced degrees, like she has, especially as the nursing field has changed over the last 35 years.

"As advanced practice nurses, we are able to provide a different level of support, a continuity of care for parents, to assist doctors and floor nurses and help fill the gap," explained Purnell. "This was especially key when the COVID-19 pandemic first hit, we were able to help fill those roles when demands were even greater in acute and ambulatory care settings."

Purnell believes that the advance practice role of nurses is starting to become a standard across the industry, helping to grow the profession and improve patient care standards.

Purnell also enjoys that Baptist Health Sciences University is a spiritual environment because God is so important to the role of nurses.

"I encourage prospective students to reach out if they're interested in continuing their education," said Purnell. "Our program is small but we're supportive and want to see you succeed. We will give you attention and we want to see you be successful."

Baptist Health Sciences University and the proposed College of Osteopathic Medicine take important next steps in the application process

Earlier this year, Baptist Health Sciences University submitted an application to open a college of osteopathic medicine in Memphis. Research has shown that doctors tend to remain in communities where they trained, which suggests these doctors are likely to stay here after finishing their education. This is important because the Mid-South, like many areas of the country, is facing a shortage of primary care and family medicine doctors, especially in the wake of COVID-19. The majority of DOs go into primary care and essential care specialties and tend to serve in rural and underserved communities, all of which is consistent with Baptist Memorial Health Care's mission.

DOs bring a unique, patient-centered approach to every specialty across the full spectrum of medicine and is one of the fastest-growing professions in health care today, representing one-fourth of all enrolled medical students. Throughout their four-year curriculum, DOs receive the broad training and exposure that prepares them to practice in a range of medical specialties, including primary care, pediatrics, obstetrics and gynecology, emergency medicine, psychiatry and surgery. The majority of DOs tend to serve in rural and underserved communities. Baptist Memorial Health Care employs 141 osteopathic physicians of Baptist Memorial Group's 800 employed physicians working in many different areas, including family medicine, internal medicine, pediatrics, general surgery, ophthalmology and radiology across the three-state region.

In 2021, Baptist University hired Peter Bell, DO, as vice provost and dean of medical education for the college of medicine. The American Osteopathic Association recently honored Dr. Bell with the 2022 Distinguished Service Award, which recognizes significant contributions to the osteopathic medical profession through leadership, excellence, achievement and dedication. With his doctor of osteopathic medicine expertise and experience helping other universities gain accreditation for new colleges of osteopathic medicine, he is an excellent candidate to lead BHSU's College of Osteopathic Medicine (COM) proposal.

Dr. Bell and his team are still working to recruit professors and health care educators to teach in the proposed College of Osteopathic Medicine.

In early October, the proposed COM earned candidacy status and the right to move forward on the path to becoming accredited.

"We have 24 months to achieve pre-accreditation status," said Peter Bell, DO, vice provost and dean of medical education at Baptist University. "We're now in the process of applying for pre-accreditation and hope to get approval in May of 2023. Once we have pre-accreditation status, we can recruit students for the fall of 2024."

If the application is successful, we would seat our first class of students in August 2024. As part of the process, in fall of 2022, Baptist University began interior renovation of the building located at 1115 Union Avenue.

BHSU Expands Learning Spaces with Realistic Immersion Rooms

In Summer 2022, Baptist Health Sciences University launched two new learning spaces called Immersion Rooms, one in the nursing building and one in the collaboration building. This immersive learning experience is unique to Baptist locally and is the only of its kind in the tri-state area.

The space allows for a safe, low-stakes learning environment for future health care workers. Dr. Cheryl Scott, assistant professor

and interprofessional simulation coordinator with a Certified Healthcare Simulation Educator (CHSE) certification; Dr. Cathy Stepter, dean of nursing; and Dr. Angel Boling, program chair of undergraduate nursing, brought the immersion room concept to Baptist University.

The room can also be set up to look like actual Baptist facilities, such as a surgery suite at Baptist DeSoto, labor and delivery at Baptist Women's or the ICU at Baptist Memphis. With this feature, professors hope that the transition to real-world Baptist spaces will be even more seamless for their students.

"We are meeting students where they are," said Dr. Scott.
"During the early stages of COVID-19, we had to be creative,

and the idea for Immersion Rooms came from that time. Our students had to keep learning, but we couldn't safely access hospitals and clinics for several months. Now we have a way to bring the space to our classroom in a safe and educational way."

The rooms can reach all the senses. The walls have

hot spots that students can push for a quiz, such as finding all the errors in a hospital room or surgery suite. The audio is consistent with the environment, like traffic on the bus or doorbells ringing or dogs barking in the home, forcing students to block out ambient noise that isn't necessary to the care delivered. Instructors also have props they can add into the room to simulate a messy house, a busy bus or a hectic office.

"The Immersion Rooms allow students to learn the way they want to learn, through gaming and technology," said Dr. Boling. "This learning experience engages our students, teaching them how to think critically in an interactive space."

The space can also help prepare for the worst-case scenario.

"We can play out a disaster at the hospital or a work site with this technology," added Dr. Scott.

Baptist University will be filming at Memphis metropolitan area Baptist facilities during the coming months to integrate real-space videos into their Immersion Room settings while continuing to use the spaces they already have filmed.

With the space, professors can stage almost any scenario

BHSU Honors Program

The BHSU Honors Program is a purposeful community of scholars committed to academic excellence and service. In keeping with the University's foundation to heal, preach and teach, the Honors Program seeks to share "the light of Truth for mind, soul, and body" through four areas: scholarly research & advancement, professional & spiritual enrichment, cultural & social engagement, and service & leadership development.

This fall we accepted 15 new members for a total of 105 Honors students comprising 13% of the current student population. The Honors Program is a member of the National Collegiate Honors Council. The average programmatic grade point average is 3.509 and we have 20 students in the Living Learning Community of the residence hall.

The program has several initiatives to support these efforts. The Led to Lead initiative helps students learn advanced leadership and professional principles, offers leadership opportunities through the Honors Student Leadership Council, and encourages students to engage in leadership opportunities on campus and in the community. The Gifted to Give initiative held three fundraisers: in the fall, Share the Thankfulness, in the spring, Share the Love, and in the summer, Share the Sunshine. Students invite others to support the Honors Program and the

establishment of an Honors specific scholarship. The Created to Commune initiative sponsors several social events at the end of each trimester as well as provides regular opportunities for connecting with our students through monthly Honors Colloquia. Through the Honored to Serve initiative, students have volunteered to serve at the Honors-led chapel service in the fall, Student Open House Showcase in May, Black Men in White Coats in April, Future Health Care Professional Camp in June, and our annual Toy Drive for the Baptist Children's Hospital in November. This year has opened up new upcoming service opportunities including the Baptist HealthCORE tutoring program for high school students and the Tennessee Health Career Summit on November 17, 2022. The Scholarship to Share initiative allows students to present their Honors Capstone Experience research each trimester through the Honors Forum. The Spring Honors Forum will become part of a new event sponsored by the Honors Program, as well as Baptist University's honors societies and professional organization, called Elevate: Student Research Symposium being held on March 30-31, 2023. - Blood pressure checks, nutrition education and medication management performed by nursing population health students once per week as their clinical rotation
- Smoking cessation class provided by respiratory care students

The greatest outcome of this partnership is the relationship being built between the City View Towers residents and the Baptist University community.

BHSU radiation therapy graduate Lauren Brown, started the BHSU Student Mothers Support group in the fall of 2021. Student moms meet by Zoom every other week for a time of support and encouragement. In the late spring, the mothers and their children

















met at the Memphis Zoo for a fun day together. In October, the library sponsored a BHSU Student Mothers Group story time and crafts Halloween party.

One of the most amazing opportunities for the year was the opportunity for the University along with team members from the Baptist system to support the people of Ukraine. When the unrest broke out in February, Karen Smith sent a prayer for the Ukrainian people to the University community. A student, Samantha Kelley, has strong ties with Ukraine and asked if more could be done than just prayers. Kelley's email spurred the creation of a group of six people associated with the University with ties to Ukraine. From the six-person group, a food and hygiene product campaign began which included an elementary school in Marion, AR along with the BHSU campus. The campaign resulted in two large pallets weighing

651 lbs. of hygiene kits for men, women, and children, 683 lbs. of goods and 265 lbs. of clothing being sent to Ukraine through the ministry Operation Ukraine. However, the project did not stop there. The Baptist Foundation and the Pastoral Care Department of the Baptist system heard what the University was doing and wanted to help with the fundraising campaign. The Baptist Foundation sent an email to all team members asking for monetary gifts for the Ukrainian effort. With a matching gift of \$10,000 from both the Pastoral Care Endowment Fund and the Baptist Foundation over \$30,000 was collected. Because of the connections of the committee of six more than 75,000 people were impacted by the donations. Working through Crosslink Memphis, a medical supply ministry, a donation valued at \$26,432 worth of antibiotics was sent through the Giving Tree Medical organization to several hospitals in Ukraine. A donation valued at \$83,689 was given to missionaries who had lived in Ukraine to give to other missionaries in their network working on the ground with small clinics to distribute antibiotics, vitamins, bandaging, topical creams, and hypertensive medicine to those in need while sharing the gospel. Approximately \$3,000 was sent to a



ministry in Ukraine to purchase winter coats, gloves, hats, and socks as the displaced people prepare for the winter. Supplies were sent by air, by containers, and many in suitcases of Ukrainians in the US for meetings and support returning home. Also through the resources of Crosslink Memphis, 60,000 pairs of reading glasses valued at \$36,000 were sent to Operation Ukraine to help restore the vision of thze displaced.

Karen Smith, director of faith & service, "It was truly amazing to watch the mysterious working of God in this project."

A big thanks go to the team of six: Donna Mars, chair of the nuclear medicine department; Samantha Kelly, a senior nursing student; Kasson Sanborn, a past employee of the University who served as a missionary in Ukraine for three years; Sarah Biggs, student transition coordinator at Baptist University; A.J. Kamer, executive director of Crosslink Memphis; and Karen Smith, director of faith and service and chaplain at Baptist University.

Beverly Jordan showcases the Baptist Health Sciences University mission of preparing graduates for careers of service and leadership by providing a comprehensive health sciences education within an integrated environment of learning and Christian principles. She was recruited as the ideal student who shares a commitment to Christian values and ethics, academic excellence, and lifelong professional development.

Jordan graduated with her nursing diploma from Baptist Memorial Hospital School of Nursing (now Baptist Health Sciences University) and stayed with Baptist throughout her career. She started as a bedside nurse and continued to learn, develop, and lead in all aspects of patient care, which led her to hold a number of leadership roles during her tenure. Some of those titles include chief nursing officer of Baptist Memorial Hospital-Memphis and the Baptist Memorial Health Care system as well as vice president and chief information and transformation officer for Baptist Memorial Health Care Corporation. Jason Little, current Baptist Memorial Health Care Corporation CEO, said it best when speaking of Jordan during her 2020 retirement, "Many of our new leaders are 'home grown' and have worked their way up into their new roles."

Throughout her career as a health care provider, Jordan was an advocate for patients. She continuously challenged the norm and determined innovative tactics to advance quality of care and patient safety. Before her retirement in 2021, Jordan was able to help the Baptist system implement the electronic medical record initiative, Baptist OneCare, which earned Baptist a 2019 College of Healthcare Information Management Executives (CHiME) HealthCare's Most Wired recognition as a certified level seven. Baptist was the only health care organization in the Mid-South to earn the recognition.

Jordan also led the implementation of MyChart, a secure portal that gives patients controlled access to the same health record their physicians and clinicians use. Jordan highlighted MyChart saying, "We cannot change health care as an industry. We have to change it on an individual level. I have to start caring about my own health, and MyChart allows me to do that." Both of these successful initiatives, plus many others, resulted in Jordan being recognized by Health Data Management as one of the Most Powerful Women in Healthcare IT in 2018.

While leading in the field of health informatics and technology, Jordan set aside time to volunteer for Habitat for Humanity, serving as chair and vice chair. She also served on the Board of Directors for Leadership Memphis and Baptist Health Sciences University. She provided health system perspectives to academic advisory boards and Deans of Nursing programs to help better equip the future of health care.

David Breedlove (2001, Respiratory Care) (2005, Nursing)

Working with veterans

Dr. David Breedlove is a two-time graduate of Baptist Health Sciences University, earning a Bachelor of Health Science in Respiratory Care in 2001 and Bachelor of Science in Nursing in 2005.

David, who has also earned a doctor in nurse practitioner, has a servant heart and work spirit, demonstrated through decades of work with Veterans and Department of Veterans Affairs across the southern United States.

He works as the nurse manager in the Mental Health Residential Rehabilitation Treatment Program at the Central Arkansas Veterans Healthcare System in Little Rock. He has also worked with the North Texas Veteran Affairs Health Care System, the Central Texas Veteran Health Care System, as well as the VA Health Care Systems in Columbia, South Carolina, and Memphis, Tenn.

David works as a nurse manager at the Eugene J. Towbin Healthcare Center in North Little Rock, which primarily serves veterans with mental health diagnoses, as well as geriatric veterans. The Center provides residential rehabilitative and clinical care to veterans who have a wide range of problems, illnesses, or rehabilitative care needs which may include mental health and substance use disorders, co-occurring medical conditions and psychosocial needs such as homelessness and

unemployment. All these programs provide a 24/7 therapeutic setting utilizing both professional and peer supports.

"We serve veterans with integrity," said David. "I advocate for them to receive respect and excellent care."

David credits the VA system with helping one of his relatives who served in the military as a combat veteran to recover from post-traumatic stress disorder, and to become very successful in life.

David recognizes that his empathy and commitment to excellence is in part due to his time at Baptist University, which occurred simultaneously while working fulltime at the VA in Memphis. David said this was a difficult time, but has contributed to his success. He finds it funny that he ended up working in mental health since he admitted that the mental health was one of the toughest courses he took in the nursing program. As a result, Dr. Breedlove encourages

nursing students to give each nursing course their all because the program at Baptist is designed to make each student a "whole nurse."


"Nursing school isn't easy, but it opened a lot of opportunities; Baptist University helped prepare me," said David.

As a result of his hard work, Dr. Breedlove's career has exposed him to many opportunities at the VA, and in the private sector, including working as a nurse in the emergency department, intensive care, patient safety and quality, nursing education, nurse recruitment and nurse management.

Following his time at Baptist University, he has earned a Master of Science in Operations Management, a Master of Science in Nurse Leadership in addition to a Doctor of Nursing Practice.


On October 14, 2022, Dr. Breedlove received his 20-year service award with the VA. One reason he cites as having remained with the VA is to help serve one of the country's two most underserved populations – veterans.

"My education from Baptist University has helped me to branch out into anything I wanted to do," said David.

"The world needs more Baptist sonographers"



"The sonography program is very challenging and I'm very thankful for that," said Patti. "I wanted to learn it all and to earn a bachelor's degree so I could explore various specialties."

Following graduation, Patti worked at St. Jude in Memphis, Tennessee for eight years before moving to Cleveland, Miss. for her husband's job. There, she worked at a vascular clinic in Cleveland for five years.

"Vascular sonography was not my favorite class at Baptist," laughed Patti. "But I'm so glad I took the class

and took the boards, because that allowed me to take that position and succeed in my role."

Patti passed board examinations in abdomen, neurosonography, OB/GYN, pediatrics, vascular, and physics.

During her time at the vascular clinic in Cleveland, Patti saw a pattern of patients in need of accurate sonography results; accurate results lead to accurate diagnosis and more accurate treatments. For example, peripheral artery disease, PAD, is common in the Delta region of Mississippi. A sonographer is searching for a stenosis, and if that is missed or mistakenly reported, a patient could lose a leg or experience gangrene.

In March 2021, Patti opened her own sonography clinic, The Sonogram Specialists LLC, in Cleveland. She sees a wide variety of patients for any sonography needs, from children to pregnant women to elderly patients. She has a pediatric ultrasounds registry, which is rare in her part of the state. She works with hospitals and doctor's offices to perform accurate, detailed sonograms, which she is able to do with her education and board exams.

"Sonography is an amazing field," Patti said. "I am grateful I went to Baptist University because it made me the sonographer I am."



William Curry (2017, Biomedical Sciences)

Great opportunity to grow

Mission work is a true calling. William Curry graduated from Baptist Health Sciences University in 2017 with a Bachelor of Science in Biomedical Sciences. Following his undergraduate studies, Will worked at Crosslink Memphis, a medical supply ministry, before pursuing a Master of Science in Physician Assistant Studies.

During his time at Crosslink Memphis, Will learned how he could get involved in medical mission trips from a local level. He worked to track down unused medical supplies and pharmaceuticals from local hospitals, mission trip administration and learned about the impact medical mission trips can have. Will applied for a mission trip to Peru in early 2022 through Crosslink Memphis. This is the most recent in a long list of mission trips he's taken, which includes a 2016 trip with Baptist University to Belize, a 2019 medical mission trip to India and a 2019 medical mission trip to Tanzania. However, the trip to Peru was Will's first as a physician's assistant and first since COVID-19 changed the health care landscape.

"Most of our work on mission trips helps meet general health care needs," explained Will. "We see the full spectrum of patients from children to pregnant women and the elderly population."

Will said they often help with diet and hydration best practices.

"In Peru, the diet is very starchy carbbased, with potatoes and plantains easily accessible," said Will. "On top of that, sodas can be easier and cheaper to come by than clean drinking water."

Because of this diet, they see patients with type two diabetes and pre-diabetes and heart issues. Some patients have extreme dental issues, needing teeth pulled, so the mission trips include dentists. Several patients experience allergies and chronic pain, which the missionaries help to address.

Due to heavy flooding in January 2022, the mission trip wasn't able to set up a clinic in the village. They had to arrange for patients to visit their boat, where the mission workers practiced and stayed for the entire week, holding appointments for eight hours a day. They treated approximately 500 patients that week.

For patients in Peru, like the village on the banks of the Ucayali River where this mission trip served, they have to travel to bigger cities for medical care and often get skipped by Peruvians who have more money for their health care. For example, if a patient presents with a skin wound, they're seen by the doctor then must source materials like gauze and hydrogen peroxide to bring back for the doctor to use. This is why medical mission trips are so important.

When asked if he had any advice for future medical mission workers, Will



recommended that workers remain flexible.

"I was blown away by how much of this most recent trip to Peru didn't go to plan," said Will. "Don't expect to run on schedule. You'll get to see so much, and your perspective will be forever changed."

If mission work isn't in your future but you want to help, Will recommends reaching out to Crosslink Memphis to see how you can volunteer locally. You can also support current Baptist University students, faculty, staff, and alumni on their mission trips. Liquid Legacy is sponsoring two different Baptist University teams to Peru in the spring of 2023. Each team will serve for one week.

The total cost for this trip per person is \$1450 + International Airfare (approximately \$2600 total). This will include international airfare, domestic airfare, all ground transportation, lodging and some meals. As you can imagine, the \$2600 cost for this trip poses quite a hardship for some and your support will help reduce the cost needed to participate in this invaluable clinical


